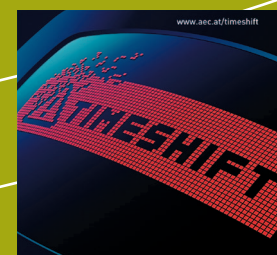

COLLABORATIVE BROADCASTING

Free media, thanks to the development and adaptation of technologies that transcend the boundaries of individual media are creating expanded possibilities for communication particularly in socially and geographically marginal zones. Their creative patchworks of technologies and communication systems are especially well adapted to each respective social, political and spatial context and open up expanded scopes of action.

Free media are defined as communication platforms and public access is simultaneously the precondition and the most important tool for bringing about communication. The mission is to make available opportunities for the expression of opinions and self-representation, to actively involve listeners in the work with the medium and to integrate them into the production process. The central challenge for free media is on the one hand the low threshold of access to the medium itself, and this is accomplished by providing expertise both with respect to content and technology. This can happen only by means of a confrontation with immediate local and social conditions. On the other hand free media initiatives are confronted with political tendencies to further regulation and control of media platforms. How can future possibilities for free communication platforms be provided and free media experts be involved in political discussion processes?

Technologies and public access

In order to open up media spaces for everybody, debates centering on technological developments have taken on increasing relevance in past years. Though, it has not been the demands of free media themselves – for freedom of opinion and information, diversity of opinion, and open access – that are changing; the change has been in the instruments, which have undergone an ongoing process of transformation. Thus, the strategies and practices have had to transcend the purview of individual media. In this context, however, the technological innovations and adaptations constantly orient themselves on the concrete needs of those who use them, whereby the demands and challenges are in continual flux. Marginalized groups like immigrants as well as movements critical of globalization are increasingly using both analog and digital media for self-representation and political activism. Moreover, the reach of networks operating via free media in geographically peripheral zones is increasing.

Therefore free media have to permanently confront the issue of access opportunities. How can “old” analog and “new” digital technologies be made and kept useful for and accessible by the various different user groups and communities and for the infrastructure of the free media themselves? The

Ole Frahm, Michael Hüners, Torsten Michaelsen
The free radio group LIGNA was set up in 1995 by the media theorists and radio artists Ole Frahm, Michael Hüners and Torsten Michaelsen, all working for “Freies Sender Kombinat (FSK)”, community radio initiative, Hamburg. In various shows and performances they have examined the meaning of diversion in or of radio broadcasting by referring amongst other things to forgotten or discarded uses of this medium and developing thereby new practices and procedures (Mental Radio Show). Production of performative radio plays (Labyrinth and Interferenzen. Ein nächtlicher Gang durch eine sterbende Stadt – Labyrinths and Interferences. A walk at night through a dying city) and development of concepts as to how the radio can intervene in public spaces that are under surveillance, so that the public there reemerges as a situation out of control (Radioballett: Übung in unnötigem Aufenthalt – Radioballett: An exercise in unnecessary loitering). With these different models they examine both theoretically and practically the limits of (liberal) media theory, of closed artistic space and of political intervention.

The Cultural Broadcasting Archive is the digital audio archive of all the Austrian free radio stations. It facilitates a quick and flexible publication of radio programs on the internet. TransPons is a project that develops the archive and analyzes prevailing technical conditions with regard to the access of immigrants to radio as a medium and the use of the internet as an opportunity of self-representation and self-articulation and exchange with other ethnic groups. The project tries to promote immigrants’ participation on the internet and links local and European activities of intercultural media work by extending the audio archive CBA.

Manu Luksch – AmbientTV.net, London/GB
Manu Luksch, filmmaker who works outside the frame. Techniques and effects of live data broadcasting and transmission provide theme, medium, and performative space for many of her works. She founded ambientTV.NET, a crucible for independent, interdisciplinary art projects ranging in form from installation through documentary, dance, and theatre, to sound and video composition and live manipulation. Manu, who studied Fine Arts in Vienna and Bangkok, was artistic director of the Media Lab Munich before she moved to London where she is based now.

Virtual Borders – Documentary film project by Manu Luksch
Virtual Borders tells the story of an Akha village headman, Abaw Busev, who goes on a journey from Thailand to China. He is accompanied by an Akha radio broadcaster and the filmmaker. Their aim is to attend the gathering of the Akha people and to transmit discussions about their situation and future of the Akha people to remote mountain villages. The documentary film structure recognizes the emerging “media loop”: TV, radio, and the internet. An internet link from the meeting in China to the radio station in Thailand was established, which transmits the live discussions to the villages in the mountains. The 3 million Akha are an ethnic minority group scattered across the border regions of the five countries Thailand, Burma (Myanmar), China, Vietnam and Laos. “A film always has an end while reality continues.”

way free media deal with technical innovation and adaptation works like a modular construction system: The technical infrastructure in actual practice is a patchwork of anything that’s available, usually not technical mastery is called for but rather the capability of assembling combinations and tinkering together “intelligent patchworks”. Going about this engenders cooperative relationships whose very hybridity is a source of creative and ultimately politically relevant potential. Tech-heads work together with – or are themselves – political activists, artists and immigrants and set up tangible interfaces between the users’ communication needs and the technical means available.

Free media projects therefore redefine and reinterpret technologies, like the German Ligna Group’s “Radioballett” or Manu Luksch’s “Virtual Borders”. Meanwhile, many free radio stations have been facilitating everyday operations by making use of various digital, internet-based applications (CBA, YARM). These combinations of technical improvisation and communicative interaction expand free media’s ability to act and to a certain extent are even what make cooperative undertakings possible in the first place.

The Radio FRO Conference addresses these developments and discusses the latest communication tools, strategies and projects in order to create real occasions for communication and participation.

Public access and control

The existence of civil society networking and communication is also a question of access and control. On a political level regulations of the WWW and attempts for a restrictive use are being discussed. At the same time the replacement of old analogue transmission technologies by new digital broadcasting systems will lead to changes in frequency spectrum and modification within the regulatory frameworks on national and international level. Thus the diverse independent communication platforms need to develop common strategies for contributing to the decision process, introducing alternative perspectives and solutions and preserving access to future distribution platforms. In fact the current developments are fundamental threats to the freedom of information, expression and the plurality of media. It is essential to be aware of and to take an active part in these discussions. At the Radio FRO Conference experts from different fields in the media sector discuss the consequences of these developments as well as the necessity of future alternative models for community (media) platforms.

Experts discuss scenarios of the information society, their effects on community media and pose the question of future alternative models for open, cross-platform information exchange. Creative and innovative dealing with technological development is a prerequisite for the future of community media initiatives. Which are the consequences of the changeover from analog to digital broadcasting, the currently discussed changes in international radio frequency planning, or attempts to regulate the world wide web? How can these processes, which bring about new standards and new regulations, be followed and designed by community media initiatives? And at the same time: How can alternative and independent platforms be developed to guarantee and foster the freedom of speech and of the exchange of information and opinion?

Wolfgang Temmel – sinnlos/Blind TV, Graz/A
Born in 1953, stays in New York and London, now living in Wies in Styria. Work in various media and art forms. In and through various projects temporally or spatially not simultaneous “works of art” emerge from shared authorship or joint processes of authorship. These works are not mainly intended to be objects of art, but ought to reflect the creative process itself. In the production of these works Temmel creates momentary systems based on prevailing contexts and mechanisms, which he takes up, goes over and transforms into a part of his work: “space” of art which cannot be depicted and which can only partially be grasped in finished “products” (video, book, radiowork, CD, brooch) as this is about forms of dialogue, the interplay of intentions and accidents, events that these projects provide a stage for without entirely defining them.

Blind TV – Sinnlos
Sinnlos (meaningless) does not consider itself to be a “project for disabled people”, but to be a project that sees its central theme in the methods and strategies of hindrance and handicap in daily life, in society and art. Sinnlos also sees itself as a postulate for a new way of thinking and acting. With Blind TV, blind or visually impaired people have the possibility to create their radio programs independently. The program is run frequently at Radio Helsinki, the free radio station in Graz, A.
